For Reporting

Title IX Coordinator

Ideal for survivors who want to file a formal complaint. Anyone can make a report if they witnessed the assault or are aware of the details, but it is strongly encouraged to allow the victim to lead this process as to not revictimize them. However. some employees are obligated to report, and everyone should report if there is an immediate danger or threat to the campus community.

Wilmington Police Department

Ideal for survivors who want to file criminal charges or want to pursue a criminal investigation. Anyone can make a report if they witnessed the assault or are aware of the details, but it is strongly encouraged to allow the victim to lead this process as to not revictimize them.

You do not have to choose between the above two reporting options, you can do either or both. It is up to you!

For Medical Care

Campus Health Services

Ideal for minor health complaints such as cuts and scrapes. The health center can also coordinate STI and/or pregnancy testing through a community partner if needed.

New Life Clinic

Ideal for survivors who want free STI screening/testing, HIV testing, and/or pregnancy testing. Can also provide support for men and women who want to know more about their support options for an unexpected pregnancy.

Clinton Memorial Hospital

Ideal for survivors who need a sexual assault forensic exam (SAFE) or prevention treatment for STIs, HIV, and/or pregnancy.

If you go to the hospital right after the assault, then bring a change of clothes. If you have already changed out of the clothes you were assaulted in, then please bring them in a bag with you.

CMH will contact police by default, but you are not required to file a police report; the law requires that this exam is free and adult survivors not be pressured in to filing a report to receive services.

For Supportive Measures

Title IX Coordinator

Ideal for survivors who want to request on-campus supportive measures such as a no-contact order, housing accommodations, class changes, etc.

Campus Advocate

Ideal for survivors who want to request on-campus supportive measures but want to do it through a confidential resource.

Other supportive measures:

Please schedule an appointment before going to the Support Services Office to ensure the space is ready for you. The services provided by the Campus Advocate include:

- Emotional support, information, and referrals
- Accompaniment throughout Title IX process or forensic exam
- Accompaniment to police station or help accessing legal advocacy
- Coordinate supportive measures (e.g., no-contact order, housing accommodations, class changes, etc.)

Confidentiality will be broken if the survivor discloses a plan to attempt suicide, a threat of violence to others, or abuse of a minor; at which point, only "need-to-know" information would be shared with the appropriate authorities to maintain a safe environment. The advocate can also be compelled by the law (i.e., subpoenaed).

Campus Health Services

Health and Wellness Center (across from CSS turf area) Monday-Friday 8AM-5PM

Schedule appointment via **Setmore**

Please schedule an appointment or call before going to the Health and Wellness Center to ensure the space is ready for you. Medical services are provided to students free of charge at the Health and Wellness Center. The medical clinic is available to treat minor health complaints (i.e., cuts, scrapes, etc.). The Student Health Center can also coordinate STI and/or pregnancy testing on-campus through their community partner.

Note: Choking can have delayed affects for up to 72 hours after the incident occurs – this means there is a risk of someone's throat swelling and closing even 3 days after an incident. Please see a doctor even if you feel ok.

Please schedule an appointment or call before going to the Health and Wellness Center to ensure the space is ready for you. Confidential counseling services are available, a state independently licensed professional clinical counselor (PC) will provide a diagnostic assessment, treatment plan, and subsequently therapy sessions to assist students with a wide variety of wellness and mental health concerns.

The campus counselors have privileged confidentiality, meaning they have the privilege of keeping your information confidential on-campus and in the court of law. Confidentiality will be broken if the survivor discloses a plan to attempt suicide, a threat of violence to others, or abuse of a minor; at which point, only "need-to-know" information would be shared with the appropriate authorities to maintain a safe environment.

Anyone can make a report if they witnessed the assault or are aware of the details, but it is strongly encouraged to allow the survivor to lead this process as to not revictimize them. However, some employees are obligated to report, and everyone should report if there is an immediate danger or threat to the campus community. The Title IX Coordinator would also coordinate supportive measures (e.g., nocontact order, housing accommodations, class changes, etc.) for survivors if needed and appropriate. If you were assaulted, WPD can help by providing transportation to the hospital for a forensic exam, coordinate a forensic interview with a trained interviewer, and of course do a formal investigation and provide protective measures such as a Protection Order.

Regardless of your immediate desire to file a report or not, it is recommended to preserve evidence just in case because it is a time sensitive process.

In 2016, the mission expanded to include men who experienced sexual assault as adults. 1in6 offers a 24/7 online helpline where men and the people who care about them can chat one-on-one with a trained advocate, free and confidential weekly online support groups for men who have experienced sexual abuse or assault, and information and resources to help the healing process for male survivors or help people who would like to be allies.

This is not specific to survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, but it is specific to LGBTQ youth who are processing trauma, struggling with their sexual orientation or gender identity, having suicidal ideations, or simply feeling alone. The Trevor Project offers accredited lifesaving, life-affirming programs and services that create safe, accepting, and inclusive environments over the phone, online, and through text.

If you call outside of business hours and need accompaniment or transportation, it may take up to an hour for the advocate to get to you. An on-campus advocate can call AVC on your behalf to set up services per your request. Main Street Wilmington, OH 45177 ER Phone: 937.382.9257	CMH provides many services, as it is a hospital, but services specific to survivors include facilitating a sexual assault forensic exam (SAFE) by a trained sexual assault nurse examiner (SANE), providing treatment for any injuries, and preventative treatments for STIs, HIV, and pregnancy. A SAFE is free of charge (i.e., covered by Ohio's SAFE Program) and this is not dependent on your ability to pay or your choice to make a police report. If you go to the hospital right after the assault, then bring a change of clothes. If you have already changed out of the clothes you were assaulted in, then please bring them in a bag with you. CMH is required to contact police, but again, you are not required to file a police report.
