ACCEPTABLE 2023 TAX DOCUMENTS

IRS DATA RETRIEVAL:

The best way to verify tax information is by consenting to the FUTURE Act Data Direct Exchange (FA-DDX) that is part of the FAFSA. If you have not already provided consent, then you should go to www.studentaid.gov, log into your FAFSA record, select "Make FAFSA Corrections", and navigate to the Providing Consent section of the form. From there, follow the instructions to provide consent to have the FA-DDX Tool transfer your 2023 IRS Income Tax Information into your FAFSA.

IRS TAX RETURN TRANSCRIPT:

To obtain an IRS Tax Return Transcript, go to www.irs.gov. Click on "Get Your Tax Record". Click on "Get Transcript by MAIL", OR "Get Transcript ONLINE".

Make sure to request the "IRS Tax RETURN Transcript" and not the "IRS Tax Account Transcript" for tax year 2023. You (and your spouse, if married) will need your Social Security Number, Date of Birth, and the address on file with the IRS (normally this will be the address used when the 2023 IRS Tax Return was filed). If successfully validated, you will receive the Tax Return Transcript with 5–10 business days. Submit all pages (front & back) to us.

IMPORTANT NOTE:

If you and your spouse filed separate 2023 tax returns, then you will need to submit 2023 Tax Return Transcripts for both you and your spouse.

VERIFICATION OF NON-FILING LETTER:

To obtain a Verification of Non-filing Letter, print the IRS Form 4506-T from the Financial Aid Forms webpage.

- Complete lines 1–4, following the instructions on Page 2 of the Form 4506-T.
- Enter the student's WC ID in Line 5b.
- Check the box on Line 7 and the attestation box above the signature line.
- Sign and date the form and enter the taxpayer's phone number.
- Mail or fax the completed form to the appropriate address/fax number associated with the taxpayer's state of residence.

You will receive the Verification of Non-filing Letter within 21 days of the IRS receiving your request.

AMENDED TAX RETURN FILERS:

An individual who filed an Amended Income Tax Return (IRS Form 1040X) for tax year 2023 must submit to Wilmington College:

- A signed copy of the 2023 IRS Form 1040X (Amended U.S. Individual Income Tax Return) that was filed with the IRS. Be sure to submit both pages of the tax document. AND
- A 2023 IRS Tax RETURN Transcript, which will reflect information from the originally filed tax return. Be sure to submit all pages (front and back) to us. OR
- A signed copy of the 2023 IRS Form 1040 and Schedules 1, 3, C and F (if applicable) filed with the IRS.

VICTIMS OF IRS TAX-RELATED IDENTITY THEFT:

An individual who was a victim of IRS tax-related identity theft must submit to Wilmington College:

- A copy of the signed 2023 Income Tax Return and Schedules 1, 3, C and F (if applicable) filed with the IRS; **AND**
- An IRS 4674C letter (a letter from the IRS acknowledging the identity theft) or a statement signed and dated by the tax filer indicating that he or she was a victim of IRS tax-related identity theft, and the IRS is aware of it.
